

I am excited to bring you updates from the office of Nedaak in this newsletter. We have been working in exciting times with the approval of the 2021-31 Forest Management Plan (FMP) on Friday, August 13, 2021 and the passing of the FSC Audit on Friday, May 13, 2022 (who says Friday the 13th's are bad luck?!).

The 2021-31 FMP acknowledged that, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, opportunities to host in-person information forums and meetings during the critical stages of FMP development were not able to occur. These meetings ensure issues or concerns are addressed. Nedaak has committed to remedy this by holding information sessions in all of the Nedaak communities. Maps of planned operations for 2021-2031 will be available as well as the 2022-23 Annual Operational Plans.

The Kenogami Forest is certified to the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) standard. This was a huge project to complete and every year we have an audit to ensure we are upholding the standards. FSC not only looks at forest management, but also employment standards, relationships with Communities, and environmental values and impacts. We just completed our first annual audit and have a few things to work on - we will be seeking input to assist with some conservation value work.

As always, our doors are open for all to come and ask questions, look at maps, or just to share stories of the forest with us!

SUMMER STAFF PROGRAM

With Ne-Daa-Kii-Me-Naan Inc being a company that has been in the region for over 10 years, we want to be able to give our communities the opportunity to gain real life experiences in the forest. This year we were able to hire three (3) Silviculture Assistants.

Every summer we recruit seasonal employees to work on sustainable forest management projects such as conducting surveys to determine the success of regeneration on the land, working on LiDAR plots, and ensuring quality control in manual tending.

This year, to kick off the season, our staff got to learn more about Veneer Harvesting and the major differences between Veneer Harvesting and Saw Log and Pulp Harvesting. A big thanks to Ed Hoffman of Columbia Forest Products for providing us with this great opportunity. Our staff appreciated your time, efforts, and insight!

Our seasonal staff have been working hard, learning new things, and being given opportunities to grow along the way. SOME GARDENING TIPS

Choosing a location:

- Follow the sun. Pay attention when finding a location for your vegetables to have an area where your vegetables, herbs and fruits can get at least 6 hours of sun!
- Make sure you choose a location that you can easily get water to it. Your plants will need to be watered regularly, so having a spot chosen where you can run a garden hose to it will make things much easier.
- Find your HARDINESS ZONE: Knowing which zone we are located in can mean "life or death" for your plants. Some plants need milder climates, while others need warmer climates. Make sure you check your hardiness zone.
- FROST DATES: It's not something any gardener likes to think about... but planting too early or too late in the season can mean DISASTER for your garden! You need to keep a close eye on temperatures.

TIP: Push a finger an inch down into the soil and if it's dry, it's time to water!

HAZARDS IN THE COMMUNITIES

Avian Flu (Bird Flu) is a disease that can be carried and transmitted between birds. There is currently an outbreak of a highly pathogenic avian influenza (subtype H5N1) in eastern North America. Ducks and Geese are known to be impacted by it, and with the ongoing spring migration, there are several precautions that hunters should take. They can be found here:

Blastomycosis is typically found in rotting wood and soil and spores can stir up in the air when disturbed. The spores can then infect the lungs, with symptoms including coughing, chest pain, fatigue and shortness of breath. Health experts note it is NOT contagious and is easily treatable with anti-fungal medication when caught early, but can lead to death if undiagnosed. FUN FORESTRY FACTS



COOKING CORNER

In a saucepan, bring berries, sugar and juice to boil. Reduce heat and simmer until tender (about 10 minutes). Whisk cornstarch with 2 tbsp (25 mL) water; whisk into pan and boil, stirring, until thickened (about 1 minute). Place plastic wrap directly on surface, refrigerate until cool (about 1 hour).

In large bowl, whisk oats, flour, sugar, orange rind and salt. With a pastry blender, cut in butter until coarse crumbs. Press half into parchment paper-lined 8-inch (2L) square cake pan. Spread with filling. Lightly press remaining oat mixture on top.

Bake in a 350°F (180°C) oven until light golden (about 45 minutes). Let cool in pan on rack, then cut into squares.

Feller bunchers can hold up to 8 trees of average diameter (15")! Once the arms are full, the buncher places the bunch on the ground in a direction that makes it easier for the skidder to pull it to the roadside!

A log truck can carry approximately 24 cords of 2.7 meter wood at ones (this is approximately 528 trees)!

If you were to plant 9.3 million trees yourself, it would take you 12.7 years, including weekends!

"Blueberry Oatmeal Squares"

Ingredients:

2 1/2 cups (625 mL) - Rolled oats *not instant*

1 1/4 cups (300 mL) - all-purpose flour

1 cup (250 mL) - packed brown sugar

1 tbsp (15 mL) - grated orange rind

1/4 tsp (1 mL) - salt

1 cup (250 mL) cold butter, cubed FILLING:

3 cups (750 mL) - fresh blueberries

1/2 cup (125 mL) - granulated sugar

1/3 cup (75 mL) - orange juice

4 tsp (20 mL) - cornstarch
